Source Sheet Companion Explainer: Druze Citizens of Israel

Who are the Druze?

1. The Druze faith, a monotheistic religion with influences from Islam, Hinduism, and Greek philosophy, maintains a closed community since the 11th century. Adherents marry within the community, emphasizing the religious (Ok'al) and secular (Jo'hal) distinction in attire and lifestyle. Led by a religious sage, the community prohibits polygamy, ensures religious equality between genders, and grants women equal roles and inheritance rights.

2. Estimates of the Druze population range from 0.8 million to 1 million, depending on the source. These include adjacent communities of about 250,000 in Lebanon and 600,000 in Syria, 150,000 in Israel, Jordan and the United States.

Loyalty to the country of residence among the Druze is based in a religious emphasis on the afterlife that limits aspirations for national independence in this life, a warrior tradition in which Druze generally serve and protect the state in which they are citizens, and a history of persecution that made these practices part of their own security.

Within this context, some Druze leaders define themselves as fully Israeli and even Zionist, while others consider themselves Arab citizens of the state and reject the notion of a separate "Israeli Druze" identity.

Education

35. In the 1970s, Druze leaders advocated for a separate education system separate from the general Arab schooling, leading to the establishment of the Division of Druze Education. The Ministry of Education and Culture implemented this decision in 1976, creating the Committee for Education and Culture for Druze to oversee Druze education independently. The Druze education system was tailored to reflect the community's heritage, with new textbooks, teacher training, and infrastructure development. The system aimed to instill a Druze-Israeli consciousness, emphasizing commonalities with Jews while distancing from Arab identity. Within five years, the Committee established a comprehensive independent education system. Nearly a 75% success rate in 2022.

The OECD uses the square root of the number of people in a household. In contrast, the SSA assigns a higher value per capita, which results in a higher rate of poverty per capita in a household. The implications of this different measurement are expressed the most in families with 4 or more children, characteristic of Druze and Arab families.

Public transportation is inadequate, and mobility is constrained, as only 8% of women have a driving license. Societal restrictions also play a role. Despite ongoing efforts for a more modern society, traditional norms persist, affecting women's education and employment. Leaving the village without supervision may result in social stigma and accusations of violating sexual honor.
